



Background to the Marine Stewardship Council (MSC)


What is the MSC?



- An international, not-for-profit NGO.
- A certification and ecolabelling program.
- Sets and maintains credible standards.
- Recognises and rewards sustainable fishing practices and influences consumer choices.
- Works with fisheries and businesses around the world.
- Transforms the seafood market to a sustainable basis.

18.8% of global marine catch is MSC certified


14.20 million tonnes of MSC certified seafood


Endangered, Threatened & Protected and Out Of Scope species






MSC Assessment Tree

OUTCOME – ETP/OOS

Favourable conservation status


- 50% carrying capacity of ETP/OOS unit (minimum ref pt)
- Timebound of 3 generations or 100 years, whichever is shorter

Direct and indirect effects 'Not hindering recovery'
Direct – interaction with gear

Indirect – impact to ecosystem (scored in Ecosystems PI)

MSC Assessment Tree






MANAGEMENT – ETP/OOS

- Measures ensure 'not hindering recovery' & minimise mortality.
- Needs to be "working on the water" e.g. trends
- MSC Intent: Any relevant legally mandated best-practice measures for the UoA should be complied with
- Examples of best practice for seabirds
- FAO Best practices to reduce incidental catch of seabirds in capture fisheries
- FAO Technical Guidelines for Responsible Fisheries
- ACAP publications







MSC Assessment Tree






INFORMATION – ETP/OOS

- Information needs to be adequate to assess impact and efficacy of management.
- Evidence Requirements Framework
 - Used to evaluate information quality
 - <u>30% independent observation</u> as 'best practice' for fisheries that:
 - Operate in the high seas
 - Have ETP/OOS interactions
 - Managed by an RFMO

Fisheries may choose to be assessed against v3.0 01 Feb 2026

Fisheries entering assessment for the first time must adhere to v3.0

01 November 2030

Certified fisheries seeking reassessment must have transitioned to v3.0
