

NOTICE OF MEETING

WCPFC6-2009/01 7th September 2009

Members, Cooperating Non-Members and Participating Territories (CCMs) are invited to attend the Sixth Regular Session of the Commission for the Conservation and Management of Highly Migratory Fish Stocks in the Western and Central Pacific Ocean (WCPFC6).

With logistical and administrative support from France and French Polynesia, the WCPFC6 meeting will take place at Tahiti, Papeete, French Polynesia from Monday 7th December to Friday 11th December 2009, with Sunday 6th December reserved to start the Third Session of the Finance and Administration Committee (FAC3). The meeting venue will be the Hilton Hotel (please see details below regarding accommodation arrangements).

Accommodation

Visa for the French Polynesia

Foreign nationals from the following countries are entitled to a three-month stay without a visa:

- European Union: Austria, Belgium, Bulgaria, Cyprus, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, Germany, Hungary, Ireland, Italy, Latvia, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, The Netherlands, Poland, Portugal, Czech Republic, Rumania, United Kingdom, Slovakia, Slovenia, Sweden, Spain, Greece.

- Other countries: Andorra, Australia, Iceland, Liechtenstein, Monaco, Norway, St Marin, Vatican, Switzerland.

Maximum stay of 3 months per semester: Brazil and Chinese citizens holding a valid passport from Hong-Kong or Macao.

Nationals from the following countries are entitled to a one-month stay without visa:

North, South and Central America: Argentina, Bolivia, Canada, Costa Rica, Chile, El Salvador, The United States of America, Mexico, Nicaragua, Honduras, Panama, Paraguay, Uruguay, Guatemala.

Asia-Pacific: New Zealand, Japan, Malaysia, South Korea, Brunei, Singapour.

Europe: Croatia.

Nationals from all other countries require visas which may be obtained from the French Embassy or French Consulate in the country of residence. **The visa must be endorsed: "valid for French Polynesia"**, which applies also to aliens holding temporary vistor's permits (1 year in metropolitan France). Foreigners holding 10-year residence cards obtained in France or in a French overseas department are exempt from visa requirements in French Polynesia. Except for nationals of the European Union and foreigners holding a 10 year residence card, all foreigners entering French Polynesia must have a return ticket.

PRACTICAL INFORMATION TO HELP YOU PREPARE FOR YOUR VISIT TO FRENCH POLYNESIA

A TROPICAL CLIMATE

The French Polynesian islands enjoy a tropical climate; the maximum number of hours of sunshine is close to 3000 per year in the Tuamotu islands ! The temperature, which is always pleasant, is cooled by the trade winds of the Pacific that blow throughout the year.

The average ambient temperature is 27° C, and the waters of the lagoons are a fairly constant 26° C. While further away from the equator, the archipelagos down south, (the Austral and Gambier), enjoy cooler temperatures.

PREPARING YOUR TRIP

What is the time difference?

Tahiti and her Islands are 10 hours different from GMT. This is a 12-hour summertime or 11 hour wintertime difference from Paris, 2 hour different from the United States Pacific Coast, 6 hour from Santiago de Chile, 19 hour from Tokyo and Sydney and 22 hour different from Auckland.

The international banks with foreign exchange offices on Tahiti and on the most frequently visited islands are the Banque de Tahiti, the Banque de Polynésie and Banque Socredo. International hotels also provide this service but a word of warning: some atolls and islands in the Austral and Gambier group have no banking facilities. At the Tahiti-Faa'a International Airport, two foreign exchanger offices (Banque de Polynésie and Banque Socredo) are open in conjunction with international departures and arrivals.

Customs

Customs declarations: Upon arrival in French Polynesia, you must declare all goods you are carrying with you and pay the relevant duties and taxes to the Customs Office. However, it is possible to be exempted from paying duties and taxes on goods listed below (purchases or gifts).

What to pack?

Bring summer clothes, beachwear, sports wear and boat wear, all preferably in cotton. Have something warm available for the evenings which are sometimes cooler (lagoon side, boat trips and in the mountains). Footwear: sandals, sneakers, boat shoes.

Essential: swimming costumes, sunglasses, hat, sunblock creams (intense reflection of the lagoons) and a powerful anti-mosquito lotion (useful in the islands in certain seasons).

Business Hours

Shops are open from Monday to Friday 7:30 am to 11:30 am and from 1:30 pm to 5 pm/6 pm. Saturdays from 7:30 am to 11:30 am.

Some shops are also open afternoons. Most places are closed on Sunday including many restaurants except for the Papeete market, which is very busy from 5 in the morning.

There you can find a wide variety of flowers, food, pareos, hats, mother of pearl, art objects and a variety of souvenirs.

Postal and telecommunication services

Papeete's Central Post Office, located near the yacht wharf and Bougainville Park, is open weekdays from 7 am to 6 pm and on Saturdays from 8 am to 11 am. There is a philatelic center at the Post Office. There are many international card-operated phone booths throughout most of the islands.

Water and electricity

Tap water in Papeete and Bora Bora is safe to drink; enquire locally on the other islands. If in doubt, use mineral water in sealed bottles.

Electricity: 110 or 220 volts (60Hz) depending on the island and type of accommodation. Check before plugging in.

Health

No vaccines are required except for passengers from high-risk countries (this information can be obtained from your airline). On the island of Tahiti, good sanitary facilities and health services are available. The cities of Papeete, Taravao (peninsula of Tahiti) and Uturoa (Raiatea) have fully equipped hospitals. Other tourist islands at least possess a hospital or a clinic.

Which language?

While the official language is French, the indigenous languages, such as Tahitian, are still widely practiced in each archipelago. English is also widely spoken particularly in tourist areas.

TAHITI AND HER ISLANDS AT A GLANCE

IN THE SOUTH PACIFIC

Tahiti and her Islands are located approximately 17100 km from Metropolitan France. These islands cover a huge ocean surface of some 4 million square kilometers, which is the same area as Europe.

The island of Tahiti in the Society Islands group, is 17° 32 S and 149° 34 W, situated half way between California (6200 km) and Australia (5700 km).

Tahiti is 8800 km from Tokyo and 7500 km from Santiago, Chile.

118 ISLANDS IN 5 ARCHIPELAGOES

Tahiti's 118 fabulous islands are scattered across five far-flung archipelagoes, each with their own particular character and whose inhabitants have adapted the ancient rhythms of the ocean and the sun to the 21st century.

The Society Islands (made up of the Leeward Islands and the Windward Islands), is a group of high tropical islands encircled by coral reefs and lagoons.

The main one of which is Tahiti, the largest of the Polynesian islands, with Papeete as its administrative capital.

Tahiti is composed of two majestic volcanic mountain ranges topped by clouds. Their highest points being Mount Orohena (more than 2000 feet) on Tahiti Nui and Mount

Mairenui (around 1300 feet) the smaller volcano, in the heart of Tahiti Iti, Tahiti's peninsula.

The two islands are linked by the isthmus of Taravao.

The Society islands: this group also includes the famous islands of Moorea, the magical island, separated from her sister island Tahiti by only a 17 km channel, Huahine, the garden of Eden, a wild island situated 175 km Northwest of Tahiti which still maintains a very lively, traditional culture, Raiatea and Tahaa, two sacred islands with lush vegetation, enclosed in the same lagoon and offering perfect sailing conditions, famous Bora Bora, the romantic island with her breathtaking lagoon and beaches fringed with coconut trees, and finally Maupiti, the forgotten island, nestled in a jade lagoon, the smallest, and the most authentic island of the archipelago.

The Tuamotu group is a collection of low islands or atolls. A very special world, situated between sky and sea.

Each island encircles its own lagoon with a ring of coral and beneath the crystal-clear waters of each are spectacular underwater gardens and fish of every imaginable size, shape and color.

It rarely rains and is a perfect environment for pearl farming. Rangiroa, Tikehau, Manihi, Fakarava are the most frequently visited atolls and provide classified hotel accommodation.

The Marquesas, "Enua Enana" or "Land of Men", are a group of high islands near the equator, 1500 km away from Tahiti, whose steep mountains are inhabited by wild horses, goats and pigs.

The most well-known are Nuku Hiva, Hiva Oa, Ua Pou and Ua Huka which offer the tourist, among many other points of interest, a magnificent arboretum.

The Austral Archipelago, situated far to the south, is also made up of high islands: Rurutu, Tubuai, Rimatara, Raivavae and Rapa.

Last inhabited islands of the South Pacific, these ancient volcanoes with soft relief are far off the beaten track.

With their "marae", ancient sacred places, and majestic centuries old stone "tiki", these mysterious islands still have not revealed all of their secrets.

There are a variety of tropical plants and plants from temperate regions also.

This environment is favorable for farming, and the Australs provide the other islands with many different vegetables.

A special attraction on the Austral Islands occurs every year from June to October when the whales meet in the warm, shallow waters. **The Gambier Archipelago,** rarely visited, consisting of the high island of Mangareva and its fringe of islands which are the eroded remains of its former gigantic crater, is situated in the far eastern corner of French Polynesia.

OUR CULTURE

TATTOO AND DANCE: THE CULTURAL REVIVAL

As early as the 18th European navigators indicated the existence of tattooing in Tahiti. Tattooing was prohibited at the time of the missionaries, but it didn't disappear completely.

For Polynesians, tattooing is a means of asserting their ma'ohi cultural identity and it favours the use of black colour to the detriment of others. Inspired from vegetal or animal geometry, most of the time a tattoo has a symbolic meaning.

Men and women display the tattoo like jewelry. Thus, contrary to the "occidental intimist" approach, the tattoo was first meant to be seen at first.

For several years now, there has existed a new generation of particularly gifted tattoo artists in Tahiti and her Islands whose talents are more and more solicited by the passing tourists.

In addition, these tattoo artists now export their art by participating in various shows abroad.

Artistic expression can also be seen in woodcarving, the prerogative of men. For this they carve, as the mood inspires them, ancestral graphic and symbolic designs in precious woods such as "tou", a local variety of purple wood, and "miro" or rosewood.

Marquesans excel in this area and produce superb pieces, spears, war clubs and "umete" or fruit bowls, which can be used as a large dish. They also employ volcanic stone, coral and even bone to fashion hundreds of decorative and useful items such as "penu", food pounders.

And lastly, the re-development of the mother of pearl industry has made available the subtle iridescence of these polished shells. The fascinating changing colors have been incorporated to embellish dance costumes and in the making of shimmering jewelry.
