ANNUAL REPORT ON WCPFC HIGH SEAS BOARDING AND INSPECTION SCHEME

Background

- 1. This paper provides a summary of HSBI activities conducted under CMM 2006-08 for the period of 1 January 2013 31 August 2014.
- 2. TCC10 is invited to note and discuss the HSBI activities.

CCMs reporting on implementation of CMM 2006-08 through Annual Report Part 2

- 3. WCPFC 10 adopted TCC9 recommendation that "...responses to serious violations, the number of HSBI reports submitted against the number of HSBIs conducted and the timeliness within which HSBI reports are submitted should be included as elements in the CMR" (TCC9 Summary Report, para. 236 and WCPFC 10, Summary Report, para. 218 iv). Consequently, the 2014 Annual Report Part 2 template covering 2013 activities included a question on implementation of paragraph 7, 30, 32, 33 and 36, 40 and 41 of CMM 2006-08. CCMs were asked to report on implementation of the aforementioned paragraphs. CCMs had the choice of answering "Yes" meaning the obligation has been implemented; "No" meaning the obligation has not been implemented; or "N/A" meaning CCM determined that the obligation is not applicable. CCMs also had the opportunity to provide further information on each obligation and/or attach any supporting documentations.
- 4. CCMs responses in Annual Report Part 2 feed into the draft Compliance Monitoring Report (CMR) together with HSBI reports received by the Secretariat. The Secretariat, based on answers provided in Annual Report Part 2, as applicable CMM 2006-08 paragraph 13 advice, other HSBI reports it received also made a determination on the applicability of the obligation to the CCM. The Secretariat largely concurred with CCM, and only made a different choice on applicability based on HSBI report records that suggested otherwise. Annex 1 provides a summary of CCMs responses to CMM 2006-08 in Annual Report Part 2 covering activities for 2013.

HSBI activities for the period 1 January 2013 – 31 July 2014

5. Currently there are 13 members that have notified the Commission, through the Executive Director, of their intention to participate in conducting boarding and inspection activities under the WCPFC HSBI Scheme. Kiribati was the latest addition to the inspection register, in March 2014. Some have also provided notifications in accordance with paragraph 6 of CMM 2006-08, regarding the application of the WCPFC HSBI to Fishing Entities. A list of these Members and the number of vessels included on the Register of Authorized Inspection Vessels is shown in Table 1.

6. In 2013, 7 members' submitted 83 HSBI reports in accordance with CMM 2006-08 paragraph 30. From 1 January 2014 – 31 August 2014, 4 members submitted 37 HSBI reports for vessels flagged to 6 CCMs which were boarded and inspected under the HSBI scheme. Table 2 provides a summary of the number of high seas boarding and inspection reports received by the Secretariat by year including a count of the number of vessels inspected under the HSBI scheme by flag. Figure 1 provides a summary of the number of vessels boarded and inspected, by year and by vessel type.



- 7. Annex 3 shows the geographical distribution of boarding and inspection activities as contained in the HSBI Reports provided by Members to the WCPFC Secretariat, during 1 January 2013 31 August 2014, in accordance with paragraphs 30 and 31 of CMM 2006-08. In 2013, the Republic of Korea, Japan and New Zealand for the first time, conducted HSBI activities. Some of the geographic coordinates appear to indicate inspections activities which are not WCPFC high seas areas; and these need to be clarified with the submitting Member which conducted the HSBI inspection activities.
- 8. In 2013, the Secretariat received from 7 Members who conducted HSBI activities 83 reports in accordance with CMM 2006-08 paragraph 30. Three out of 83 reports included a paragraph 32 notification of "alleged serious violation" the list of serious violations for the purpose of the HSBI scheme is provided in paragraph 37 of CMM 2006-08. The alleged serious violations were related to obstruction of VMS (painted antennae) and failure to maintain sufficient records of sharks and south pacific albacore. Other alleged infringements by fishing vessels of the Convention or CMMs are summarized in Annex 2.

Other issues

- 9. During the year, the Secretariat received two suggestions from CCM MCS personnel who are directly involved in HSBI activities of possible areas for improvement with Commission's HSBI Scheme. The two suggestions are summarized here:
 - a. To include a question asking for ALC units in section 15 (Please show me your....) of the Standardize Multi-Language Questionnaires.
 - b. To establish a real-time process where Inspecting Authorities can verify if a vessel is transmitting on the WCPFC VMS, either through communications with the Secretariat or directly with the flag State, especially given the fact that many boarding take place outside of normal business hours.
- 10. There have also been regular comments that the details of flag State authorities are not always current and up-to-date. CCMs may be aware that the individual CCM portals on the WCPFC website, which were used for the Secretariat to provide individual draft CMR and supporting documentation to individual CCMs, also includes WCPFC Official Contacts list which is updatable by each CCM. The Secretariat would note that the individual CCM portals does seem to provide the Secretariat and CCMs with some possibilities, which could allow CCMs to be able to more easily maintain their other WCPFC contact details such as details of flag CCM authority for the purpose of the HSBI Scheme. The Secretariat intends to continue to explore these options.
- 11. The Secretariat is interested in working with interested CCMs to update the Standardized Multi-Language Questionnaire, noting that the translations of a revised questionnaire would also need to be undertaken. The current version of the Standardized Multi-Language Questionnaire is available on the WCPFC website at http://wcpfc.int/high-seas-boarding-inspection. In addition, there is currently a process in place where CCMs, upon request, can receive WCPFC VMS.

Administration

12.
