ISSUES:

1. Article 14(1) of the Convention provides the scope of TCC work. WCPFC5, WCPFC6, WCPFC7 and TCC7 provided several priority issues for TCC. TCC7 provided several comments on content and expected outputs with notes that the work programme appeared too ambitious when compared to the status of initiatives as seen at TCC7. The initial draft paper has been updated from TCC7 to reflect comments from TCC7 and CCMs with respect to format and also merging with the approved Strategic Plan for the 2012-2014 TCC Work Plan.

DECISIONS/ENDORSEMENTS REQUIRED;

2. The Commission is invited to review and approve the TCC work plan and budget for 2012-2014.

ADVICE AND RECOMMENDATIONS

3. Using discussions in WCPFC7 and TCC7 as a guide, the proposed technical and compliance elements of the Commission's Work Program for 2012-2014 are presented in **Attachment 1**.
4. Some work program elements may be accomplished "in-house" and at nominally zero cost, whereas others may require outside expertise and significant financial support and are reflected in the proposed budget presented at FAC5.
5. The proposed budget for 2012 and indicative budgets for the Compliance Section are also attached for information as **Attachment 2**.
