# LIST OF CAPACITY ASSISTANCE REQUESTS AND CAPACITY DEVELOPMENT PLANS

#### WCPFC-TCC17-2021-8B 17 September 2021

# Paper prepared by the Secretariat

#### Purpose

1. This paper summarizes Capacity Assistance Needs identified by CCMs, based on this year's Annual Report Part 2 reporting and/or draft Compliance Monitoring Report (draft CMR) replies. The summary provided also indicates where CCMs have provided submissions related to Capacity Development Plans (CMM 2019-06 paragraphs 14 - 15) as part of their replies to this year's draft CMR. The information in this summary is as of  $17^{\text{th}}$  September 2021.

#### Background

2. As in previous years, and in accordance with CMM 2019-06, CCMs may provide in their Annual Report Part 2 and in replies to draft CMRs, indications of areas where assistance is needed.

3. CMM 2019-06 paragraph 27 states:

27. Upon receipt of its dCMR, each CCM may, where appropriate, reply to the Executive Director no later than 28 days prior to TCC each year to:

(i) provide additional information, clarifications, amendments or corrections to information contained in its dCMR;

(ii) identify any particular difficulties with respect to implementation of any obligations; or

(iii) identify technical assistance or capacity building needed to assist the CCM with implementation of any obligations.

4. Also, CMM 2019-06 paragraphs 14 and 15 states:

14. Notwithstanding paragraph 4, where a SIDS or Participating Territory, or Indonesia or the Philippines cannot meet a particular obligation that is being assessed, due to a lack of capacity, that CCM shall provide a Capacity Development Plan to the Secretariat with their draft Compliance Monitoring Report (dCMR), that:

(i) clearly identifies and explains what is preventing that CCM from meeting that obligation;

*(ii) identifies the capacity assistance needed to allow that CCM to meet that obligation;* 

(iii) estimates the costs and/or technical resources associated with such assistance, including, if possible, funding and technical assistance sources where necessary;

(iv) sets out an anticipated timeframe in which, if the identified assistance needs are provided, that CCM will be able to meet that obligation.

15. The CCM may work together with the Secretariat to draft the Capacity Development Plan. This plan shall be attached to that CCM's comments to the dCMR.

5. In respect of Capacity Development Plans, Circular 2021/64 dated 29<sup>th</sup> July 2021 announced the availability online for each CCM of their draft CMR and referred CCMs to the online support system (<u>https://wcpfc.freshdesk.com/support/home</u>) for guidance on viewing the draft CMR Potential Issues and to submit additional information online.

#### Link to the Strategic Investment Plan

6. The Commission, at its meeting in December 2018, agreed to several decisions that formalized the linkage between the Strategic Investment Plan and CCM requested Capacity Assistance Needs and Capacity Development Plans once referenced in the provisional CMR. The relevant agreed decisions from WCPFC15 Summary Report were:

154. The Commission approved the 2018 Strategic Investment Plan as a means to target investment to address the priority needs as identified by developing states, including effective participation. (Attachment F). The Commission agreed that this Plan would be updated annually by the Secretariat for approval by the Commission and that the Secretariat would report to the Commission on implementation of the Strategic Investment Plan each year.

155. The Commission agreed to make any capacity assistance needs identified in the provisional Compliance Monitoring Report and in Part 2 reports (as may be agreed by TCC each year to be contained in the Executive Summary of the Provisional Compliance Monitoring Report), public domain data that will inform annual updates of the Strategic Investment Plan.

7. Since 2019, the *Implementation of Article 30 of the Convention* webpage on the WCPFC website has been maintained by the Secretariat at this link:https://www.wcpfc.int/implementation-article-30-convention. Copies of the WCPFC Strategic Investment Plan and past years CMM 2013-07 annual reports for all CCMs may be accessed from this page.

# Obligations where assistance needs were identified

8. The 2020 Strategic Investment Plan includes a list of Capacity Assistance Need areas from the Final Compliance Monitoring Report covering 2019 activities (see **Table 1** below). The Secretariat confirms that two CCMs provided some replies in Annual Report Part 2 to the Capacity Assistance Needed score from the Final Compliance Monitoring Report (refer to **TCC17-2021-AR Pt2**). At the time of preparing this paper, no additional information in relation to the progress of Capacity Development Plans had been received.

Annex 1 also collates notes from developing members and participating territories on areas where assistance was received in response to their capacity assistance needs. The complete set of CMM 2013-07 annual reports for all CCMs for reporting year 2020 are posted for TCC17 as **TCC17-2021-11\_rev1.**<sup>1</sup>

Authorised users of CCMs may view individual CCMs indications of assistance needs by:
 a. reviewing the full draft Compliance Monitoring Report on the Intranet or in MS Excel export format and filtering by the appropriate column to show the CCMs and CMM

paragraphs where CCMs had indicated they had an assistance need ("Capacity Development Plan = Applicable" or "Capacity Building requested = YES"); and

b. reviewing the Annual Report Part 2 on the Intranet or in MS Excel export format and reviewing individual CCMs reports for relevant obligations listed in **Table 4**.

13. Copies of reports in response to Capacity Assistance Needed scores from WCPFC17 are viewable by authorized users of CCMs through the secure side of the WCPFC website as **TCC17-2021-dCMR01**, and **TCC17-2021-AR Pt2** respectively. Copies of Capacity Development Plans submitted to TCC17 are viewable by authorized users of CCMs through the secure side of the WCPFC website as **TCC17-2021-dCMR01-CDP**.

# Secretariat's Comment

14. Due to the COVID-19 global pandemic much of the work of the Secretariat through 2021 was progressed electronically through email and skype exchanges, as well as one-on-one zoom meetings. Throughout 2020/21 the Secretariat has continued to assist individual CCMs, on request, with WCPFC reporting requirements, including Annual Report Part 1 and Part 2, online Compliance Case File System guidance, and use of the WCPFC High Seas Transhipment E-Reporting (TSER) system and VMS Reporting Status Tool (VRST). In 2021, advice was also provided on request to CCMs with their consideration and development of Capacity Development Plans as part of replies to the draft CMR. Such assistance from the Secretariat seems to be helpful in circumstances where a CCM national administrations has changes in staff who are involved in supporting WCPFC matters or where a better understanding of how to use the online system can assist in more efficient processes for CCMs.

15. A new 'WCPFC Helpdesk' available since late 2020 also provides brief reference information for members on how to access and complete reports and to access and make updates to some WCPFC datasets. (<u>Helpdesk: WCPFC (freshdesk.com)</u> These are very short guides with new topics progressively being added as resources permit.

# Recommendation

16. TCC17 is invited to consider the capacity assistance needs listed in Tables 1 to 3, and Annex 1 and any other needs as may be identified by CCMs during TCC17's review of draft CMRs when developing the Provisional Compliance Monitoring Report and to note the task set out in paragraph 38 (ii) of CMM 2019-06.
